

From Humble Beginnings to Government House

Mangere Historical society members and visitors enjoyed listening to a fascinating family history of the Thomson, Fenwick and Mappin families. Elizabeth Somervaile is the Great grand-daughter of George and Jeannie Thomson who arrived in N.Z from Glasgow in February 1863 on the sailing ship "The Gertrude". They lived on the side of a gully in Grey St, Auckland, presumably what is now Grey Ave before heading to the Kaipara, but had difficulties getting something with enough room to transport their large cases, piano, carpets and furniture.

Chief Manukau came to their rescue and offered his largest war canoe and six big Maori men to man it. Dressed in their traditional flax skirts they were an impressive sight as they loaded the canoe, strong brown muscular bodies contrasted with the white Scottish people. On arrivng at their destination they unloaded it below the high water line on the Kaipara, explaining that it was Tapu above it.

Another settler helped them to reload their things onto a smaller boat and it went on upstream to Port Albert. Those who were to become known as Albertlanders had not had a chance to look at the land they had bought, before arriving there. With no roads, the settlers seldom saw their neighbours.

George and his son George Lamberton Thomson cleared their land and pit sawed timber was used to build the first completed wooden cottage at Matakohe. Their children grew up and married into other immigrant families.

They had two sons and two daughters, Ruby and Ivy. Ivy married a Stirling who was the originator of the now famous Kauri museum. After thirty years of contributing so much to this area, the Thomson family moved to Wymondley on the upper reaches of the Tamaki River, at Otahuhu.

George Senior died in 1894. His brother William Richard Middlemore Thomson came out from Scotland to help his sister-in-law and family. They bought 350 acres of land on the other side of the river, that had been owned by the missionary Mr Fairburn. Part of their house is now incorporated into the Auckland Golf Club at Middlemore. In later years Mr R.W.M. Thomson sold his share of this land to Ruby's father and returned to Scotland. It is now occupied by Kings College, the Golf Club and Middlemore Hospital.

George (jnr) and his wife Amy moved to a large house on the corner of St Vincent and Remuera roads, called Araroa. This is now a retirement complex with lovely mature trees that had been planted by George and Amy. Their daughter Ruby (Grandmother to the speaker) married Frank Crossley Mappin and had their reception there in 1909. The newly married couple started off their life in Silverdale growing apples and pears for the Auckland market. They had a wharf and a packing shed built on the Wade River.

Their three daughters were born here,Laura, Marjorie and Ethel, mother of Elizabeth.

Ethel was married for 49 years to George Fenwick a notable eye surgeon in Auckland. He died of cancer just before Ethel herself suffered macular degeneration which left her practically blind.

The Mappins humble circumstances were radically changed when a telegram arrived announcing that Crossley had inherited his Uncle's estate in Sheffield England. This comprised of the house, named Birchlands, the contents and substantial grounds. The family moved there expecting to live permanently in England. Life did not live up to their expectations for the family and they never settled happily, so they opted to return to Silverdale N.Z. but on their arrival in New Zealand bought some land and a house on the NE side of Mt Eden. They renamed it Birchlands after their Sheffield house, and it remained their family home for forty years.

The 12 acres of sculptured gardens was a sanctuary to the very private Crossley and Ruby, but they had a strong sense of community responsibility and frequently opened their gardens for garden parties for St John Brigade members, Horticultural Societies and Conference functions.

It was a huge shock to them to learn that Crossley had also inherited the Baronetcy, so at 59 he became known as Sir Frank Mappin Bt. The same name as his Uncle from whom he had inherited the unexpected wealth. Elizabeth spoke of the 25 years that she and all the family had enjoyed the magnificent property and the love and care of her devoted grandparents.

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In 1962 the family realised that no-one in the family was in the position to take over the responsibility and upkeep of this property and the idea of subdividing was unthinkable. The idea was formulated to present the property to the Queen to use as her new Auckland Government House. The present owners were to have the use of the property for their life-time but in 1966 they moved out and presented the property to the Crown and the people of New Zealand.


After making sure that his immediate family were well catered for Sir Frank and Lady Ruby Mappin contributed significantly to the development of the City of Auckland.

On moving to a smaller home they donated many of the pictures and some furniture to the Northern Club. His long term involvement from 1925-55, on the Council of the Auckland Museum determined that he donate many Maori adzes and the near perfect skeleton of a previously unknown species of Moa, which was named after him and is still on display there. He endowed a large contribution for the building of the Auckland War Memorial Museum which is considered as one of the finest heritage buildings. He also gave a large collection of armour which had adorned their entrance hall along with a dining table and chairs to the Museum.

Sir Frank had been involved in the Order of St John and he donated their Daimler car which was converted to an Ambulance and is on display at their Mt Wellington Complex.

Kings College benefited from his energy as he fundraised to move the school from Remuera to Otahuhu. He was elected to the Board when Canon Archdall was the Headmaster.

So much of his capital was given away to worthwhile causes and projects throughout his life and contributed significantly to the development of the City of Auckland.



Friday 24th the hall will be set up for sound and video to cater for the overflow attendance at the services. That evening the hall will be open for viewing photos and memorabilia.

Saturday 25th, Is the Patron Saints day of St James, events will be from 7.00 am to 7.00 pm. These will include an 8.00 am service on the Urupa (cemetery) and at 9.30am a celebration service in the church and hall.
