

Historical Society

Hear the history of Customs & Excise

The Mangere Historical Society were entertained by an absorbing talk on the history of Customs and Excise by Andrew Adams, who is an expert on the collection of Customs Tax through the ages.

He explained how the early rulers soon realised that by taxing the various imports and exports from their kingdoms they were able to raise the necessary funding for the weapons required for their many wars.

The Romans he said used the taxes to build their roads and aquaducts while Longshanks - Edward 1 brought tariff duties to his people in 1275. Using his trusted Barons and Lords to collect the taxes on alcohol and wool he forbade the export of yew that was required for his armies longbows. The goose feathers used for the flight of the arrows was also taxable. The gathering were in fits of laughter when Andrew explained the origins of several fingered gestures.

The gathering learned how Henry V instituted passports to allow the army to travel safely to Europe and back and how Charles II used his 'royal prerogative' to institutionalise a Civil Customs Service in 1675. The uniform adopted was that of the Royal Navy and it was explained that while the New Zealand uniform had changed dramatically they still wear the Naval epaulets to show their rank.

The introduction of the Customs Tax with its huge taxes on liqour, tea and tobacco was, the gathering heard, responsible for the smuggling trade. The first New Zealand Customs officer was George Cooper who came to the country from Sydney with Governor Hobson. The meeting was told that he was very corrupt and used his ill gotten gains to buy Maori maidens for himself and allow finances for Hone Heke to purchase muskets to overcome his neighbouring tribes.

Mr and Mrs Cooper and their eight children returned to Australia and seemed to disappear completely.

The meeting was told that in the early days in New Zealand there were 45 Custom Houses situated at ports mostly on the West Coast. Today NZ Customs have a computerised system that is the envy of many countries

Today they have specialised dogs to detect, not only drugs but also terrorism powders etc, also these days containers and baggage can be x-rayed to ensure that nothing illegal is being smuggled into the country.

The members of the Mangere Historical Society left the meeting with a better understanding of the work undertaken by the NZ Customs Service

The Anti Smacking Law

Did YOU know that it is against the law to punish your children by smacking them? Under the old law it was okay to use force for correction as long as the force was "reason-

In New Zealand there have been too many cases of parents using too much force on their children with many cases of child abuse each year. In the face of this, the Crimes Act was changed and a new section 59 inserted.

The only time that you can use reasonable force on a child is to -

(i) Prevent harm to the child or another

able'

- (ii) Prevent the child from engaging in criminal activity
- (iii) Prevent the child from engaging in offensive or disruptive behaviour.
- Performing the normal daily tasks which are part of good parenting.

The law is Clear; there can be no use of force for disciplining a child.

If you smack your child for punishment you could be prosecuted by the Police and/or referred to Child Youth and Family for child

The Police have discretion as to whether to prosecute for minor cases of assault against a child, where the offense is considered to be so inconsequential that there is no public interest in a prosecution.

The Police have written some guidelines as to how the section is likely to be interpreted.

(i) To Prevent harm to the child or another person

To stop a child

- · Running across a busy road
- Touching a hot stove
- Inserting a metal object into a power point
- · Striking another child or person with an object
- (ii) Prevent the child from engaging in criminal activity

To prevent a child

- From damaging or stealing property
- The child from assaulting other people or themselves
- (iii) Prevent the child from engaging in offensive or disruptive behaviour.

To prevent a child

• Throwing objects or food

(iv) Performing the normal daily tasks which are part of good parenting.

For example

- Changing nappies
- Dressing
- Securing a child in a car seat
- · Applying sunscreen

In all these permitted circumstances the force must be reasonable and cannot be used as pun-

It is against the law to use any objects or weapons to smack a child. Hits around the head or kicking would be considered assault and could be prosecuted.

The Police have made it clear that they do not want to criminalise good parents. In a review over the six month period from September 2007 to April 2008, Police attended 288 child assault events.

13 involved "smacking" and 69 involved 'minor acts of physical discipline'

All of the 13 cases involving "smacking" and 65 of the 69 "minor acts of physical discipline" were determined to be inconsequential and therefore not in the public interest to prosecute. Of the four cases prosecuted, one was withdrawn after successful completion of diversion and three are yet to be resolved through the Court.

Over recent weeks ICON's Security Group Patrol Managers, Peter Vandermade and Rei Katamiro have been actively visiting the Mangere Bridge retail stores drawing the attention of shopkeepers to some basic rules that should be applied when it comes to security.

Shopkeepers were advised to ensure that front windows of stores were not blocked by signage as this tended to deminish the ability of passers by from seeing any unlawful action taking place in the store. Icon says that it is advantageous for people passing by to see figures in the store from the waist to the top of the head. Where possible it is suggested that visibility be as open as possible.

Outdoor lighting should be checked to ensure that these are working. Additionally it was recommended that quality locks be employed as well as bars or grills over windows etc.

Finally ICON recommends that if shop keepers do not have their premises alarmed that they give this matter some serious thought and have a monitored alarm system installed.
